Definitions

Plagiarism is:

Deliberately or unintentionally using unoriginal content without giving credit to its sources. Plagiarism can be, but is not limited to: copying and pasting; paraphrasing; and patch-work writing. Patch-work writing is defined as a selection of words and information from several sources without providing the origin of the presented works and without proper unique context. Plagiarism is not limited to professional or established works, but is also defined as work obtained from fellow students or past students if the assignment is designed for individual credit.

Cheating is:

Deliberately or unintentionally obtaining or providing an unauthorized, dishonest, or unmerited advantage in academic endeavors. Cheating can be, but is not limited to (1) turning in or taking credit for fraudulent work achievements (2) stealing or copying another's assignment (3) stealing and/or possessing unauthorized tests or exams (4) communicating (verbally or otherwise) during tests (5) copying from another (6) using unauthorized study guides, books, and other information, electronic or otherwise (7) lying.

Deception is:

Deliberately or unintentionally supplying a Hopewell STEM Academy Faculty member with false information. Deception can be, but is not limited to (1) falsely claiming to have submitted an assignment or completing a task (2) falsifying an explanation for missing a deadline (3) avoiding taking responsibilities for one's actions.
